



CONFLICT-OF-INTEREST STATEMENT

Journal *The Medical and Ecological Problems* requires all authors and reviewers to declare any conflicts of interest that may be inherent in their submissions. Conflict of interest for a given manuscript exists when a participant in the peer review and publication process has ties to activities that could inappropriately influence his or her judgment, whether or not judgment is in fact affected. Financial relationships, personal relationships, academic competition and intellectual passion are usually considered to be the most important conflicts of interest.

When authors submit a manuscript, they are responsible for recognizing and disclosing financial and other conflicts of interest that might bias their work. External peer reviewers should disclose to editors any conflicts of interest that could bias their opinions of the manuscript, and they should disqualify themselves from reviewing specific manuscripts if they believe it appropriate. Reviewers should not use knowledge of the work, before its publication, to further their own interests.

According to the Uniform Requirements for Manuscripts Submitted to Biomedical Journals (http://www.icmje.org/ethical_4conflicts.html), as an integral part of the publication process, the authors, reviewers and editors are required to confirm whether they have any conflicts of interest to declare, and to provide details of these in the following form:

This should apply to all original papers, including original research, brief reports, case reports and also for comments on clinical trials.
